
Richard Bachert gets the free lunch this month!

SAN JUAN REGIONAL MEDICAL CENTER CORPORATION REPORT



The education piece of the meeting was devoted to a financial report to dispel rumors and provide factual information, not myth. Two ongoing rumors are that the hospital is going bankrupt...it is NOT! and that the hospital is being sold to a large healthcare conglomerate...it is NOT!

Several changes in State and Federal reimbursements have changed over the past five years, creating severe decreases in revenue. In 2014 the Sole Community Provider status converted the formula for disbursing funds in the State's Safety Net Care Pool Program (SCNP) resulting in a \$10 million decrease in revenue. (SCNP is to compensate for services provided to those who, for whatever reason, cannot pay.) In 2016 Medicaid payment rates were cut, causing another \$10 million decrease in revenue. In 2018 adjustments were made in the contractual and reserves allowance to offset the revenue hit from prior years, but the cuts did not go deep enough to stabilize the budget. Even though it appeared that the hospital had a profitable operation, in fact, it did not. In October of 2018, an interim CFO was brought in to clean up the budget disparities and to provide a more accurate picture of income and expenses.

The current financial recovery action plan includes elements of Growth, Net Revenue Recovery, and Cost Reductions and Containment. In July, 91 "projects" were identified which would lead to associated savings. Fifty-six of those projects are estimated to provide \$9.4 million in savings.

Recently there were a number of employee "layoffs" to avoid redundancy of positions and to tighten up employee payroll expenses. Ninety-five positions were identified for budget cutting with 20 of those being open positions not filled. Seventy-five positions were vacated, none being nursing staff or immediate patient service providers. The ultimate goal of SJRMC is always "Safe, High Quality, Patient Care." Some employees were offered other positions, while others left for employment elsewhere. Some "retired," while others left the area or remained otherwise "unemployed."

You can help keep our hospital viable by supporting the hospital and its clinics, keeping healthcare local. Being understanding and supportive of changes that will be made to create a sustainable model for our future. And to be Ambassadors in the community!
