#### **OLD BUSINESS**

Review 2019-2020: Marilyn Montoya reviewed the 2019-2020 schedule as executive meetings prior to luncheon and programs at the CATE center. ## SAN JUAN REGIONAL MEDICAL CENTER CORPORATION REPORT AUGUST 2020

It has been several months since the Corporation met as a group, in public, without masks and social distancing...what a mess we've got here! While the Corporation didn't "meet," we did get a report from the hospital Board Chair, Sherry Galloway.

On July 29<sup>th</sup>, SJRMC released its 400<sup>th</sup> patient recovered from COVID-19! Through the hallways lined with applauding employees, medical staff, nurses and physicians the patient's recovery and discharge was celebrated. The PA system also played the Beatles, "Here Comes the Sun."

The hospital is still accepting cloth face masks and surgical caps. To date, more than 4,200 masks and 460 scrub caps have been donated! Drop off these items at the Main Entrance Monday thru Friday, 6:30 am to 6:00 pm.

The local coronavirus hot line is 505-516-0938. Call anytime.

The 2020 Community Needs assessment has been completed. Those surveyed in the County perceived our top healthcare needs are: Diabetes, Mental Health, Substance Abuse, Obesity, and Access to Care. These results will be the focus for SJRMC during the year ahead.

SJRMC sponsored the City of Farmington's Walking Trail Guide to encourage everyone to get up and get moving by adding more steps each day. A copy of the guide can be had at: <a href="https://www.fmtn.org/926/Walking-Trail-Guide">https://www.fmtn.org/926/Walking-Trail-Guide</a>

Because the hospital is open and caring for COVID and non-COVID patients, extra precautions are being taken to keep everyone safe, including:

- Mandatory cloth masks for all patients, visitors and staff upon entrance
- Limiting the number of outpatients in the facility at one time
- Designated COVID and non-COVID floors to keep the populations separate.

There is now a limited visitor policy in place:

Non-COVID patient visitation is between 9:00am and 3:00pm.

All visitors must be age 18 or older.

Visitors will be screened.

One visitor is allowed per day per patient. That is: ONE PERSON PER DAY TOTAL! Overnight visits are not allowed.
