A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

November 2021

Recently I was reading a book of poetry by Joy Harjo, the 2019 United States Poet Laureate. Last year, she was a "Zoom Guest" at San Juan College during a One Book One Community event and had made campus visits a couple times in earlier years. I got to read and discuss her poetry while I was a student in one of Vicki Holmsten's classes...one of many I have enjoyed, including Writing Your Memoir.

I appreciate the way Harjo combines her life as a Native American Woman and the cultural teachings of her Muscogee (Creek) Nation.

In her most recent memoir, Poet Warrior, Harjo writes "Let go that which burdens you. Let go any acts of unkindness or brutality / From or against you / Let go that which has burdened your family / Your community, your nation / Or disturbed your soul / Let go one breath into another." These words are powerful and resonate with me...as a prayer or a blessing. Laura Da', the Eastern Shawnee poet and teacher who has interviewed Harjo for several publications, explains: "In the Shawnee language the way we greet and ask after one another is written as wesilaasamamo, the verb to breathe. It means that when we meet each other we are asking 'How are you breathing?'

Harjo also speaks of the beauty of breathing. "When we take our first breath, it is a promise to take on this human story; a story that has dimension in time and place. Breath is our entrance into story making — it is a promise." She adds, "Poetry stops us even as it engages us with breath- rhythms which allow the kind of insight that comes with an intake of inspiration and an outtake of that which no longer serves us."

May I suggest that we all can learn from this explanation of the purpose and meaning behind these words "breath" and "breathing."

Will we make a promise to let go of those things that burden us? Those that have disturbed our soul?

May we be mindful of the promise in letting go "one breath into another" for the good of us all.

Wishing for you all a month of thanks giving, and a bountiful Thanksgiving.

- **Lunch:** Members ordered off the menu as they arrived.
- Announcements: We are collecting \$5 donations to purchase lap blankets for patients leaving the hospital to keep them warm as they wait for a taxi or a ride to show up. You may wish to sew some or buy them yourself to donate. Bring them to one of our meetings and we'll make sure they get to the hospital.
- ➤ Presentation by Gail Aspromonte: In 1878 Aztec had a simple eight room building with a stagecoach. In 1905 the railroad took the place of the stagecoach. It was located a few blocks southwest of the train depot on Main Street. The American Hotel was built in 1907 on this site. It served meals and had 2 cots for D&RG Railroad workers. Traveling judges, attorneys, and jurors stayed at the hotel. A man was even hung from a tree behind the hotel. In 1947, the hotel's name was changed to the Aztec Hotel. Mabel Lester refurbished the hotel in 1980. It was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1985. Gail and John Aspromonte purchased the hotel in the early 1990s and began operating it as Miss Gail's Inn. The Inn is said to be haunted. Gail, her son, and guests have experienced numerous experiences. Gail started restoring it one room at a time. She heard doors closing as she was cleaning and her dog would never go upstairs. There is a couple dressed in Victorian wedding attire, a lady who floats down the stairs, and a cranky old man prefers room 7. There are other haunted buildings in Aztec. The quilt store has a lady ghost who will throw the fabric on the floor if she doesn't like where you put them. The Ghosts of Aztec was cancelled this year due to the rise in COVID. It may be rescheduled next Fall.
