



Guest Speaker: Virginia Nickels

- Virginia shared her Mt. Everest hiking experiences in Nepal.
- > She had photos to show, but the technology didn't cooperate.
- > Technology set aside she gave a presentation that brought her travels alive for us.
- There were exercises to complete in preparation for the hike.
- > There was an orientation when she arrived to prepare them for the worse and hope for the best.
- ➤ High altitude pills, toilet paper, and lots of water had to be taken with them. They had no meat on the trip due to spoilage. Everything had to be carried by animal or people.
- They stopped at Tea Houses along the trail during the day. There they had tea, popcorn, and French fries with red chili. At night they stopped at base camps.
- ➤ There was no wood to burn. Yaks provide the dung to burn in big round fire pits at night. Therefore, Yaks have the right-of-way along the narrow trails.
- > It took 8 days to hike up and down a very rocky terrain. At the end, they were flown out by helicopter.

SJRMC Corporation Report 10/25/23

A large portion of the meeting this quarter was an education component regarding the "Patient Experience Program." With the theme of "What Matters to You" the 'patient experience' was defined as "A patient's interpretation of all interactions encountered during an episode of care and their perception of our ability to meet their needs and provide personalized, safe, high-quality care across the continuum." Six elements of this experience were laid out for care providers:

Connect with the patient's family and other caregivers by addressing them by their preferred name and pronouns

Introduce yourself and your role. Communicate what you are about to do; how long it will take you; and how it will impact the patient

Ask and anticipate questions from the patient, his or her family members and caregivers

Respond with immediacy, obtain assistance if required

Exit every encounter with empathy

Understanding and exhibiting "Cultural Humility," a process of self-reflection to understand personal biases and to develop and maintain respectful processes and relationships based on mutual trust. Humbly acknowledging oneself as a learner when it comes to understanding another's experience.

The HEART of Service Recovery includes:

H – Hear the concern. Actively listen to understand. Don't interrupt. Ask questions to clarify. Use positive nonverbal cues and body language. Restate the information shared to validate the information given.

 \mathbf{E} – Empathize. Be sensitive and respectful to the person sharing the concern and demonstrate the ability to understand their perspective and/or feelings.

 \mathbf{A} – Apologize. Don't become defensive. Apologizing shows concern and should be delivered in 1st person. The apology needs to be genuine.

R – Respond with Action. Take ownership of the problem. Explain why it happened if appropriate. Outline what you will do to fix it and provide a timeline. If possible, provide options for the person on how to best resolve the issue. Close the loop.

T – Thank the Patient. Always thank the patient for sharing the concern. "Thank you for trusting us with the care we deliver."

<u>Ask What Matters!</u> Some examples: What is important to you at this moment? What can I do to support you in your care today? Is there anything else you want to tell me that I haven't asked about? What are your concerns and worries right now?

<u>Listen to What Matters!</u> Empathy is an action of understanding. Being aware of, being sensitive to, and vicariously experiencing the feelings and thoughts of another.

<u>Do What Matters!</u> Our patients may not have the skills or expertise to navigate their care. It is our responsibility to support them and assist them in the process by educating and empowering them as much as possible.

Members are asked to support this project by bringing items to our meetings which will be given to the counselors running the pantry. Nonperishable, easy fix, microwavable food items, hygiene items, feminine products, etc. are needed to support these students and keep them in school.
