Threads (the High School Pantry partner) collects clothes, toiletries, and laundry soap, etc. for students living on their own or homeless. It is located in the old Farmington Administration Building at 20th and Dustin. Donations may be dropped off during operating hours: Mon 11:45-1:30 and Thurs 3:00-4:30. They also need volunteers.

Pantry

There are a surprising number of high school students living on their own or even homeless. A pantry has been set up to provide food, toiletries, and other basic needs for these students. Members are asked to support this project by bringing items to our meetings which will be given to the counselors running the pantry. Nonperishable, easy fix, microwavable food items, hygiene items, feminine products, etc. are needed to support these students and keep them in school.

Little Free Libraries

Donate books at Little Free Libraries located in Jaycee Park on the corner of Zuni and Mesa Verde Avenue and Mossman Gladden Park 1100 block of N. 

Guest Speaker: Jan Brashear, Shadows of His Wings International

- ➤ Shadows of His Wings International Academy is located in Awasi, Kenya. It is a high poverty and crisis area with no water. They have put in a water well at the school (the cost was \$40,000). They have three languages Swahili/Africa's native language, Luo/Tribal language, and English.
- ➤ The school is free for children in the community. They have 250 students. Jan shared a slide show of the children and school structure. Breakfast is always porridge. Lunch is always rice and beans. A classroom costs \$10,000 to build. Top instructors make \$300.00 per month.
- ➤ Jan has made 27 trips to Kenya. The trips are typically one to two weeks long. Her longest stay was three weeks. She knows the names of all the children. They call her Danny/Grandma. The adults call her Momma Jan. They always present her with a program representing something they have learned. She will be going again in July.
- ➤ In addition to the school, they have developed the Nyando Tailored in Love Training Center. The center is focused on teaching adults a tailoring profession. They learn how to sew using a treadle sewing machine, learn how to manage money, and run a business.
