

SJRMC Corporation Report 10/30/24 by James Conyers

The meeting was called to order at 6:00pm on Wednesday, October 30, 2024 at the Farmington Civic Center by Board Chair Shana Reeves. Dr. James Boyd, vice-chief of Staff, made a presentation about the trauma program at the Hospital. Trauma is the leading cause of death for age 46 and younger. It results in 275,000 deaths per year in the United States. Abraham Lincoln directed the creation of the first trauma manual during the Civil War. Trauma centers save time and save lives.

Sherry Paxson from San Juan College discussed the General Obligation Bond 3 on the November ballot. San Juan College has 8,821 credit students and their average age is 28 years old. They offer 140 certificate and degree programs. Passing the Bond will provide money for infrastructure improvements at San Juan College.

The minutes of the July meeting was approved by a voice vote.

The Quarterly Corporation Report was given. The new MRI machine received a 3 year accreditation. The Hospital received the New Mexico Hospital Association Quest for Excellence Award.

Nurses receiving the DAISY Award are Chelsea Creswell in the surgical unit and Connie Grijalva in the medical unit.

The Hospital supports community activities including the Road Apple Rally, Cancer Walkathon, and National Night Out.

New personnel include Tanuja Yalamarti, MD, critical care specialist; Jaren LaGreca, MD,Orthopedic Surgeon: Erin Philpott, DO, Hospitalist, and Susan Gilbert BC-PMHNP, Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse practitioner.

Chief Financial Officer, John Mayer, gave the financial report. The Hospital has 270 days of cash on hand. It is in excellent financial condition and is able to recruit talented people. The Hospital Auxiliary has been busy. The Gift Market had gross sales of \$486,542 for 2023-2024. The Riley Men's Health Fund has served 170 men and provided \$144,979 in medical assistance. The Cathy Lincoln Memorial Cancer Fund served 104 women with \$38,057 in cancer related medical expenses. The Auxiliary is always looking for volunteers.

Speaker's Bio - Margaret Cheasebro

Margaret began writing when she was nine years old. She wrote short stories about her dogs and cats. Since then she has written 10 books, both fiction and nonfiction.

She is a retired elementary school counselor, and she worked for 14 years as a reporter, correspondent or managing editor of several New Mexico newspapers. As a freelance writer, she wrote articles for many magazines, among them Good Housekeeping, New Mexico Magazine, Majestic Living, and the Denver Post's Empire Magazine. Some of her newspaper and magazine articles have earned state and national writing awards.

She has a bachelor's degree in humanities with an English emphasis from Sterling College, Sterling, Kansas; a master's degree in psychology, counseling and guidance from the University of Northern Colorado in Greeley; and a Ph.D. in metaphysics from the American Institute of Holistic Theology in Birmingham, Alabama.

She likes to play the piano and enjoys friendly competition in ping pong. Her late husband, Wally, was an elementary school teacher for more than 30 years. Her son, Philip, is an engineer in Anchorage, Alaska.

San Juan Regional Medical Center Corporation Meeting 10/30/24 by Karen Morrison

The education piece of the meeting was presented by Dr James Boyd, Vice Chief of Staff. His topic was "When Minutes Matter" and the trauma system of care. The Golden Hour is the 60 minutes following the traumatic injury.

The first evidence of trauma care came during the Civil War, when President Lincoln created a system of triage, aid stations and field hospitals. Later hospitals established emergency rooms with physicians who had no formal emergency training. In 1946 the Hill-Burton Act required all new hospitals to have an emergency room. There was no ambulance service at the time, so hearses would be sent out to "scoop and go" with the injured. The war in Vietnam introduced the use of helicopters for rapid evacuation and thus trauma centers were introduced. In 1966 traumatic injury was described as a national epidemic, and regional emergency medical services and 911 were introduced. In 1968, seat belts were required in all cars. In 1976, the American College of Surgeons outlined criteria for trauma centers and established a process for categorizing hospitals at Levels 1, 2, 3, or 4 and a review committee to visit hospitals to verify services in those levels.

SJRMC is a designated level 3 Trauma Center.

- * Provides prompt assessment, resuscitation, surgery, intensive care and stabilization
- *24-hour in-house coverage by emergency medicine physicians
- *Prompt availability of trauma care by general surgeons and anesthesiologists
- *Provides injury prevention efforts and community education
- * Robust Quality Assurance program

This level is the top for a hospital that doesn't have a surgical residency program or original scientific or clinical research.

Injury severity is not part of the criteria. Volume is not part of the criteria.

For SJRMC it is location, location and as the only hospital in the NW part of the State, there is a higher volume and more complex injuries than many Level 2 Trauma Centers. Proximity to good trauma care is a factor in fewer trauma deaths.


Trauma is the leading cause of death age 46 and younger. 275,000 deaths annually. Trillions of dollars in medical expenses and lost productivity.

The Trauma System is still an incomplete patchwork with no Federal regulation States designate trauma centers, and the American College of Surgeons certifies centers with voluntary participation.

New Mexico has many challenges:

- *2/3 of NM counties are Federally designated rural and are medically underserved.
- *All medical malpractice carriers have left New Mexico. (NM is judicial purgatory)
- *As many as 500 physicians left the state in the last year
- *As many as 8 hospitals could close in the next 5 years. (NOT SJRMC! We have a financially sound and medically robust hospital.

We are fortunate to have our community owned hospital in Farmington.
