

Meeting was called to order by James Conyers. Agenda was approved. Minutes were approved. - Moved to Farmington to serve as the minister at the Presbyterian Church for a couple of years
- ➤ During that time there were 24 deaths and she found she enjoyed comforting and helping with the grieving process and was pretty good at it.
- > Started working at Basin Hospice and now works for San Juan County as the Community Health and Social Services Director. Likes the broad title as she gets to do a lot of different things.
- ➤ Right out of Divinity School, she worked as a chaplain at the 1st Psychiatric Hospital in U.S.
- ➤ Watching YouTube videos one night she learned of an asylum in Juarez, Mexico.
 - o Was struck by how the impoverished village cared for each other
 - o She contacted the guy with the asylum that night and was invited the next day to come.
 - o She visited for 4 days and learned the system that was evident in the village
 - o Each member of the community took care of different jobs based on their abilities.
 - o All members contributed to maintain the community caring for each other.
- ➤ U.S. has the medical model and they had a more communal model
 - We are all going to learn how to live here together and how to take care of each other.
 - o U.S. is such a litigious society and we get in trouble for doing things that should be done
 - o In Juarez, they did what was necessary to promote healing.
 - o Here, we get caught up in so much regulation that it prevents giving purpose to people
- > She was able to use some of what she learned and apply them when she returned.
- The next year I took a group of young adults to Juarez to do building/repair work
- Formed a group called Vision in Action which is still active
- > Communities flourish only in so much as they take care of the most vulnerable members
- > Citizens in crisis don't know what to do and where to go to get help,
- San Juan County has developed a mental wellness resource center. The Navigation Center.
 - o Helps with housing, transportation, mental health, substance abuse, parenting, etc.
