I am looking forward to serving this wonderful group of retired educators and doing what I can to help SJAER grow and become a stronger organization. Maybe in 20 years or so, some of those Bloomfield educators will join us!!

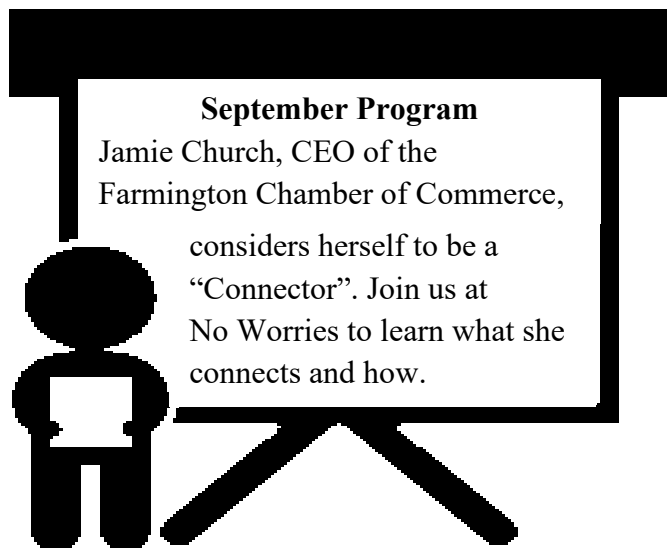

- I. Call to Order:** Meeting called to order at 11:03 a.m. Following board members were present: Debbie Klein, Marilyn Montoya, Phyllis Meier, Kathy Marten, Susan Kannard, Trish Murphy, Diane Cook
- II. Approval of Agenda:** Marilyn made the motion to approve the agenda; Phyllis seconded; motion passed unanimously.
- III. Approval of Previous Minutes:** Trish made the motion to approve previous minutes; Kathy seconded; motion passed unanimously.
- IV. Treasurer's Report:** Susan reported \$616.15 in scholarship fund; overall balance is \$2333.73.
- V. Unfinished Business**
- A. State Convention:** Debbie Klein and Karen Morrison will attend as delegates. During discussion, Marilyn ask if members could attend convention as delegates via zoom. Debbie said she would check with Russell Goff.

 5. Article IV 4.8: Debbie suggests adding a statement to clarify meeting times during the year.
 6. Article V: Standing Committee; 5.2, delete pre-retirement sentence; 5.3, reword in memoriam section; 5.4, scholarship; add 5.5 - publicity committee to include Yarn, Website, and social media.
 7. Article VI: Election
 8. Article VII: ok
 9. Article VIII: Board recommends reviewing Bylaws every 3-5 years.
 10. Article IX: Board determines that Article IX be moved to Article II.

San Juan Regional Medical Center Corporation Meeting July 30, 2025

Prior to the meeting Sonja Crum made a presentation about the renovation of the Childbirth Center which was recently completed. It has received a "Baby Friendly" designation and also many positive commendations.

Following the presentation, the meeting was called to order by chairperson, Sara Kaynor. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved. Megan Cullip, representing Basin Good Neighbor Foundation, was approved as a new member of the Board. She replaced Rick Quevado who had previously resigned.

Dr. David Devitre, Chief of Staff, discussed new staff members. They include Acadia Paine, MD, Internal Medicine; Amanda Colyer, PA, Urology; Rosalyn Womack, DO, Psychiatric; Benjamin Holley, FNP, MSN, Ear, Nose and Throat; C Scott Goldhorpe, DO, Orthopedics; Grade Boffoe, MD, Internal Medicine; Tanner Foster, PA-C, Orthopedics.

Jason Rounds, CEO, reported that the Hospital is preparing for an Audit. They expect it to be a clean Audit. He also discussed the Strategic Plan for 2025-2026.

The SJRMC Auxiliary has The Jewelry sale is planned for October 16 & 17, 2025. The Gift Market has grossed \$391,904 as of 6/30/25. They have received 17 applications for financial assistance for the Fall, 2025 semester. They have placed 20 new volunteers this year, 13 teens and 7 adults. It was mentioned that a total of 6 children out of 10 of the Hilton family have been placed as volunteers. There are 7 volunteers in the infant "Cuddler Program."

The Walkathon is scheduled for Saturday, September 13, 2025. Riley's Men's Health Fund has paid \$107,352 in medical expenses so far this year. The Cathy Lincoln Memorial Cancer Center has paid \$30,909 in medical expenses.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:15 PM.

San Juan Regional Medical Center Corporation Meeting April 30, 2025

The Corporation meeting began with an educational piece from the head of Pediatrics, Melanie Stout. She explained a new piece of equipment called AvaSure Telesitter, a Virtual Safety Attendant...kinda like a robot camera, which provides continuous monitoring of up to 12 patients. Every 15 minutes the camera documents the patient's well-being, particularly those who are deemed at risk of falling, those with certain medical conditions, patient behaviors and those with behavioral disorders. There is no recording option either audio or video assuring patient privacy. The system is monitored by a real live person watching from another area.

The Board recognized Shaña Reeves, outgoing Board President for her time serving the hospital community. Also recognized Rick Quevado who is leaving the Board after serving 4 years. CEO Jason Rounds thanked recently retired COO Ruth Brooks for her 20+ years as a Hospital Administrator and said she has agreed to continue "working" as a consultant, helping the hospital transition through regulatory changes. The IT Department is "buckling down" on Cybersecurity keeping or medical records and patient and hospital information safe.

The Robotic Surgery Program celebrated its 1,000th surgery using the DaVinci system. Using this surgical technique means a shorter hospital stay, less post-operative pain, lower rate of complications and faster recoveries.

The Childbirth Center earned high marks from the CDC in 2024 scoring 98/100 in Maternity Practices in Infant Nutrition and Care. That is 16% above the National Average and 18% above the Southwest Region Average. SJRMC also received the prestigious Baby Friendly Designation awarded for the highest standards of care for breastfeeding mothers and their babies. The Family Friendly Business Award Platinum Level was awarded for the second year in a row recognizing family friendly practices that help caregivers succeed both at work and at home.

If you attended the April concert of the San Juan Symphony you would have seen Mr. Juan Heart take the stage to remind people that music has the power to heal the heart. SJRMC is a proud supporter of the Symphony.

Our 143 auxiliaries served 13,475 hours and recently, Karen Morrison was honored for serving 5000 hours as a volunteer. There are 49 Teen Volunteers with 21 seniors graduating this Spring. At a recent Awards Event 16 teens representing Aztec, Farmington, Piedra Vista, Kirtland, Santa Fe Indian School, and San Juan College High School shared a total of \$36,000 in Scholarships. The Medical Foundation Riley Men's Health Fund paid \$37,243 to 146 applicants and the Cathy Lincoln Memorial Cancer Fund paid \$16,079 in cancer-related medical expenses to 76 applicants.
